Dear San Mateo City Councilmembers,
Please look critically at two issues regarding Measure P:

- **Is it fair to hold up Measure P** until a competing measure gathers signatures?
- **Are the interests of San Mateans reflected** in the General Plan process?

Is it fair to hold up Measure P?

Measure P is a true grass roots initiative. An alternative is being proposed by a collaboration of development interests and by advocacy organizations based outside of San Mateo. They have already had a year to gather signatures.

If Measure P was a *different* initiative that you supported (fire safety? union-level wages? better schools?), would you vote to hold it up so that development and outside advocacy interests could continue to gather signatures more than a year later?

This should be a simple ethical decision. Don't hold up the will of the people.

Are the interests of San Mateans reflected in the General Plan process?

Many people feel that the meetings to decide San Mateo's future give an outsized role to special interests who promote greater density.

I analyzed every comment on the first page of Strive San Mateo's "Public Comments"

(<http://strivesanmateo.org/documents/publiccomments/>).

The results shocked me. Seven out-of-towners and one San Matean pressed for increased density here. Ten San Mateans and zero outsiders sought moderation, changes in the information-gathering process, or non-density issues. To conclude for such a group that San Mateans really want increased heights seems specious.

If you doubt the analysis, I strongly encourage you to look first at the summary (below my signature), and then you can validate it yourself by looking at the source letters in the link.


